

This nonpartisan League of Women Voters Guide helps you choose a candidate to vote for in every race, based on their answers to the same LWV questions. You can print out a list to take with you to the polls. It's legal to consult a hard copy list while voting, but not a list on your electronic device.

We owe a debt of gratitude to the League of Women Voters for giving us this tool that makes our "due diligence" so easy.

How to use the League of Women Voters Guide

Open a new browser window and paste the following link into the browser.

On the opening screen, enter your address and scroll down to select Your Party (Democratic), then click Save & View Races.

A list of races comes up with Federal offices listed first. Click on View Race on the right to see the candidates.

It's easiest to go through the list in order. If a race has two or more candidates and you're undecided, click on View Answers to see how they answered LWV questions. Once you've made a decision, click My Choice next to the one you favor, then click Save & Next to go on to the next race. You can always come back later and change a choice if you want.

In races with only one candidate, you can simply select the candidate (a Democrat) as My Choice. There are a lot of these on the Democratic Primary ballot.

Once you're finished, you have a complete saved list of your choices. You can make changes right up to the moment you leave to vote. Then you print your list and take it with you to the polls.

Remember, it's legal to consult a hard copy list while voting, but not a list on your electronic device.

The Travis Democratic Primary is really important, because Republicans have largely given up the fight for county-level offices. So the winners of the Travis County Democratic Primary often run unopposed or weakly opposed in November's General Election.
